1930 to 1980: The Early Years of the Columbia Volunteer Fire Department

Mrs. Putt told how the Columbia Acme Grange was instrumental in starting the Columbia Fire Department, how Perry Heineman, Grange Master at the time, John Buckley, Forrest Ives and Ralph Linderman formed a committee to "investigate the situation."

In an anonymously written fire department history in the archives of the Columbia Historical Society, which seems to have been written sometime soon after 1980, the genesis of the fire department is recorded. "When fire destroyed the barn at the Tom Armitage farm in 1929 it sparked the formation of the Columbia Volunteer Fire Department." The history goes on to name the early volunteers: twenty-five men dedicated to community service. They were P.W. Heineman, Glenn Beaumont, Clyde Boone, Howard Boone, Laurence Burnett, Leon Cole, Henry Cletzer, Ross Churchward, Russell Fitch, Arthur Goodman, Harold Hales, Herbert Hales, Orlo Hales, Charles Hitchcock, Lyman Hitchcock, Ray Howard, Warren Ives, Leon Ives, Carroll Jones, Ralph Linderman, Lyle Martin, Happy Neff, Leonard Prindle, Hart Wilcox and Huet Hitchcock.

The history continues: On December 20, 1930 a motion to purchase Ford fire apparatus was made and on January 5, 1931 P.W. Heineman was hired as Fire Chief, and Lyman Hitchcock was hired as Assistant Chief. The first fire fighting unit was a used chemical engine purchased from the Berea Fire Department for \$50, and a two-wheel chemical rig was also included in the deal.

The engine had a 40-gallon tank that was filled with a mixture of soda and water. A lead jar filled with sulphuric [sic] acid was placed in the tank and when more pressure was required, at the fire, the lead jar was opened with a system of levers and a pressure of 255 pounds per square inch was created in less than a minute. Since the lead jar had to be hammered by hand, the production of these jars stopped as soon as better equipment was

built. During the following years, other equipment was purchased and built by the firemen.

When the fire department was first formed, the fire equipment was housed in a small garage in back of the town hall. This building still stands and is used today by the road crew to store equipment.

In 1942, the Columbia Township Trustees received inheritance taxes of \$16,000 from the estate of D. P. Osterling, who had owned the Columbia stone quarry where Jacquay Lake Park is now located. This inheritance tax was used to build the present fire station on Rt. 82 and also purchase 16 acres of property adjoining the fire station from the Columbia Park. It was also used to purchase a new 1942 Ford, 500 g.p.m. pumper truck, which was of navy design. Due to the war effort, fire trucks were very scarce.

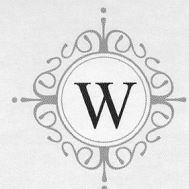
Technology Update
